


ARTICLE II — YOUR RESPONSES:





FROM THE UUA

Take steps now to maximize year end giving and set a course for the New Year

We are approaching the Conundrum Season. On the one hand, we are entering a period of thanksgiving and celebration of being together. On the other hand, we remember that as the New Year arrives, comes tax season. But in spite of that odd mix, there is good news here.

We have the opportunity to do some good in demonstrating for our Unitarian Universalist community while preparing for tax season. You will want to consult with a financial advisor before making tax or investment decisions. However, here are some steps you may consider:

- Get a Jump Start on Your Annual Pledge: No matter when your church calendar year starts or when/how your stewardship drive is conducted, you know that sometime after the first of the year, you will be asked to consider your pledge for the coming church year.
- Why not give that some personal reflection now, at year's end and while you are planning for your taxes, and make an initial judgment about an increase. Start setting aside that increase now. When the new pledge year begins, you are already at about the level you wish to be, and the increase set aside for some months can be contributed as a one-time gift all potentially earning a tax dedication as well.
- Charitable IRA Rollover: This tax extender encourages older Americans to give out of their Individual Retirement Accounts. This allows IRA owners age 70-1/2 or older to exclude up to \$100,000 a year from income. The IRA funds are paid directly to certain public charities to accomplish this benefit. Otherwise, the IRA owner would have to pay tax on the IRA funds before claiming the deduction.
 - Congress allowed this option to expire in past years, but it now standing law without a programmed expiration. Many retirees don't need the money that they must take from IRAs as a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). Being able to donate these proceeds to their congregation can be a win-win.
- Donate Appreciated Stock: A gift of appreciated stock helps your congregation or the UUA, while providing a significant tax break. To explore this option, talk to your broker about your specific situation. In general you could take an immediate tax deduction for the full market value of the stock. In addition, you avoid the capital-gains tax that owed if cashing in the securities. It's a win-win situation. The congregation and/or the UUA get a welcome contribution, while donors write off the gift and avoid paying capital gains taxes.

REGISTER NOW FOR UUA'S GENERAL ASSEMBLY, 2023!

Registration has opened for this coming year's General Assembly in Pittsburg, PA, running from June 21 - 25, 2023. General Assembly 2023 will be a multiplatform event, with registration options for in-person and/or virtual participation.

In-person registration includes access to events scheduled to take place in Pittsburgh, as well as everything available to virtual registrants. Full virtual registration includes access to the GA app, as well as all on-demand programming, live webinars, and live-streamed events.

New this year! Join our First Timers Caucus. If this will be your first ever in-person GA, use the promo code WELCOME to reduce your Adult in-person registration by \$100. One hundred spots are available. Cannot be combined with other financial support promo codes.

In-person registration is \$400 for adults, and \$300 for high school youth, emerging adults (18-24), and retired and candidate ministers. Full Virtual Registration is \$250. Register now and use the payment plan to pay over time. Financial support is also available. *In-person registration rates will increase on March 1 and again on May 1*.

NEW FOR 2023! DREAMWORK ADULT RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Starting Sunday, January 8, 10:00 am

This coming January, we are pleased to offer a new course for adults during our "first hour" religious education programming. The course introduction will be held in Classroom 3 at 10:00 am on Sunday, January 8.

Here is the course description as provided by course instructor Diane Harper.

Dreams have a long history of being regarded as divine messages in almost every religious tradition. Dreams are a thin place for encountering the Divine in all aspects of our lives. Working with our dreams opens a communication channel between the conscious and unconscious worlds, allowing us to translate the metaphor and symbol in dream language into a language that is helpful for problem solving in our waking life.

Sharing the stories our nightly dreams tell is an age-old practice, one that has provided inspiration, entertainment and revelations throughout history. Dream work offers a method for healing old wounds, living more fully and joyfully each day, increasing self-awareness, improving understanding of our life purpose, and integrating new understandings. Each of these leads, in turn, to greater empathy and compassion.

Carl Jung developed language and methods for better understanding dream meanings - concepts like projection, archetypes, collective unconscious, anima, animus, and shadow. Because it is often difficult for the dreamer to analyze and understand messages from their own dreams, projective dream work is helpful for grasping dream meanings.

In this group we will learn the basic method of projective dreamwork, how to remember our dreams, build a safe container for sharing, and then work with dreams that dreamers bring to the group. Come find out what your dreams are telling you!
