# Social Justice action was a part of the beginning of this Congregation!

Back in the 60s and 70s when integration was happening all over the U. S. several people who had started meeting on the UF Campus as UUs took a lead role in picketing a restaurant across from the University, and helped financially support others in racial justice work.

# Social Justice work is still front and center for many of our UUs!

In 2022 the Social Justice work of the Congregation was facilitated by a Social Justice Council, Action Teams and Liaisons, and the Social Justice Circle, all with co-chairs Mary Bahr and Alice Primack. The Council had 4 FOCUS GROUPS, with the main Focus on Democracy as voted on by <u>you</u> last year at our Social Justice Congregational Meeting.

- CLIMATE/ENVIRONMENT/IMMIGRATION, headed by Alice Gridley;
- DEMOCRACY, headed by Nancy Parkinoson;
- POVERTY/INEQUALITY/HOUSING, headed by Lisa Renner and Joy Avery;
- RACE AND RACISM, headed by Zoharah Simmons and Madelyn Moyer.

Activities of our Focus Groups included:

-arranging a speaker and putting together a Sunday Service, Common Read, or other educational opportunity

-keeping the Congregation members informed about opportunities for local actions and learning

-leading congregational participation in local events such as the MLK March.

Our ACTION TEAMS are busy all year with hands-on work:

EARTHKEEPERS, headed by Fred Judkins, keeps us on a good track protecting the environment here on our campus;

FAMILY PROMISE, headed by Pat Caren, works with others in Gainesville to house and feed homeless families while they work to be self sufficient

FOOD4KIDS HUNGER BACKPACK PROGRAM, headed by Chris Vulpe, sends home healthy food for the weekends for needy school children at Westwood Middle School

PINERIDGE NEIGHBORHOOD PROJECT, headed by Kirsten Flamand, works with residents of this neighborhood to the north of us, mainly helping with an after-school program for eight elementary and middle school children

Our LIAISONS TO COMMUNITY GROUPS attend local meetings and report on needs.

We have REGULAR MEETINGS EACH MONTH to plan our work and report on our activities.

## HIGHLIGHTS OF SOCIAL JUSTICE ACTIVITIES IN 2022

### MAJOR ACTION FOR OUR CONGREGATION

Three solar companies, arranged by Alice Gridley, Solar Impact, Pure Energy Solar, and Power Production Management (PPM) Solar, visited our site and submitted their estimates May-September. An energy audit was conducted by GRU resulting in a new meter installed to better gauge spikes in usage. The Federal government announced plans to grant up to 30% to nonprofits for energy efficiency. Due to the Board's focus on operating income, solar plans were put on hold till early 2023.

### OUTREACH ACTIVITIES AND ACTIONS

Day of Remembrance and Action: Vigil and Demonstration about Democracy, organized by UUFG and joined by other local groups.

Participated in annual MLK March from downtown to Citizens Field on MLK Day

Gainesville Interfaith Friends of Baker organization visited those detained by ICE at Baker Detention Center in MacClenny FL and continued contact through the mail and

ICE system for emails and video visits. An ACLU 10-page report, dated 7/26/2022, was sent to the ICE field Office Director located in Miami (*with copies to related agencies in Washington*). In December, Baker Friends delivered bags of paperback books, including some in Spanish.

Non-Partisan Petitions to get candidates on the ballot for upcoming State and Local elections

Tree planting after a Service in April, to celebrate Earth Day

Tabled after UUFG Sunday Services most Sundays in the fall, to register voters and give voter information

Wrote Letters and Postcards to Encourage Voting: This Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, working nationwide with UUtheVote, sent 1200 nonpartisan letters and postcards to promote voting! These went to registered but infrequent voters in Virginia, Georgia, and Florida.

Registered New Voters; produced and distributed voter information; created buttons; did phonebanking and textbanking; and staffed our Voter Information Booths at various events. Several members served as Poll Workers
